

Another question that I posed to Mark Stansby that he advised you would be able to help me with please!

Can you please confirm where the funding came from for the recent works to improve the A350 pedestrian/cycle crossing on the A350 Western Way as part of the Active Travel project Melksham to Hilperton please.

The parish council were frustrated to find out that this was being Government funded when there was s106 funding secured for this from the proposed David Wilson development on Semington Road. We enquired at the time and the govt money could not be used elsewhere. This application is now at Reserved Matters.

The parish council are very keen that the developers are funding such improvements, and are disappointed if it means that the funding has to be returned to the developers, could it be used elsewhere? Mark was unsure if the government Active Travel money paid for all the works, or whether it is to use some of these s106 funds. Improvements to the crossing was a CATG issue from the parish council, so are very glad that the work

has been completed, just wouldn't want the s106 funds to go back to the developers!

David Wilson Homes application currently at Reserved Matters – 144 dwellings on Semington Road – Planning Application: PL/2022/02749

Highways Contribution in s106: the sum of £200,000 towards the upgrading of the double pelican crossing on the A350 east of the A350/Old Semington Road roundabout to a double toucan crossing with associated footway and cycleway improvements, and measures to reduce the attractiveness to pedestrians of the pedestrian route on the western side of the roundabout between Old Semington Road and Melksham

Obviously the bit relating to the desire line across the A350 is still to be done, but I think the question from the parish council is, what is the rest of the £200,000 to be spent on? With many thanks, Teresa





Further to our previous communications on this particular topic, I'm now able to provide some good news to you.

The final elements to complete the scheme have now been programmed for the 28th July to 3rd August. During this period the A365 and B3353 will be closed between the hours of 09.30 and 15.30.

The resurfacing works will take place for first 3 days of the closure, with the remainder being utilised for the work associated with the road markings and installation of traffic signal detection equipment. As the work spans a weekend, the road will be open during this period. Once the installation has been finalised, there will be a period of adjustment to the traffic signal timings to optimise their efficiency.

In due course, signs advising of the road closure will be erected shortly, and please feel free to communicate locally of the proposed works.

Thank you for and the Parish Council's patience for this to be completed. It isn't the normal methodology of working and has been a consequence of the current circumstances.

The next LHFIG meeting is Thursday, and so this is too late to be considered then as the agenda has been published, therefore it will be for the next meeting (they meet quarterly). Recommendations from that meeting go to the full council meeting for approval (due to spend levels etc) on Monday 10th October and then if approved feed into the agenda of the next LHFIG meeting (they need an element of time to cost up any requests and a site visit etc) which is on 27th October, which then has to be approved at the next Area board meeting which is 7th December. So, none of this is quick stuff.

I am replying now, so that you know that the requests are in the system, as I am off for leave for the next week or so. I have copied in ClIr Alan Baines as Chair of the parish council's Highway Committee, and also Wiltshire Councillor Phil Alford as his ward.

Hi Teresa

As you know from our consultation response on the A350 Bypass and discussion at CAWS Committee meetings, CAWS remains very concerned about speeding in Shaw Hill and Whitley and would like to discuss with MWPC, and potentially Wiltshire Council, what mitigations might be possible to improve road safety.

30 MPH Signage

When entering Shaw Hill and Whitley from Melksham, there are no speed limit signs after the traffic lights by Shaw Church. Similarly there are no speed signs when entering Whitley from Purlpit. There are no repeater signs either.

We recognise that from a Highways technical/policy point of view these might not be strictly necessary, but from a road safety point of view we think they are essential. We therefore request that MWPC/WC consider erecting 30 MPH signs on the entrance to both villages and repeater signs wherever possible. We also request the 30 MPH speed limit is painted on the roads at the entrance to the villages as it is at the Gastard end of the Corsham Road in Whitley. We recognise that such actions are not a panacea, but we think reinforcement of the legal speed limit is unlikely to cause a distraction and will make a positive impact on some drivers.

20 MPH Zones

Whilst we experience most speeding events on the Corsham Road and Shaw Hill, we do also witness some events in the village lanes and particularly Top Lane, First Lane and Middle Lane in Whitley. As these roads are also narrow in places, we think they might be suitable for 20 MPH zones. Can you please advise on the criteria for setting a 20 MPH Zone and what the process might be to get that enacted?

Electronic Speed Signs

When these are deployed we note a positive impact with some drivers. Whilst again we recognise that these are not a panacea we think they are a useful tool. We therefore ask MWPC to consider a permanent sign in each village, in Whitley on the Corsham Road, and in Shaw on Shaw Hill.

Camera on the Shaw Primary School Zebra Crossing

We think a camera on the Zebra Crossing would encourage drivers to be more vigilant with pedestrians and that would contribute to traffic calming. We therefore ask MWPC to consider installing such a piece of equipment.

Other Traffic Calming Measures

We would welcome a discussion with MWPC on other additional calming measures that might be appropriate. For example we are aware of schemes that narrow the road in places but we are not informed on how successful such installations are.

Traffic Surveys

We note that Atworth Parish Council are organising a traffic census. Do MWPC have any plans for something similar in Shaw and Whitley? Also will you be able to obtain a copy of the Atworth data as the data for traffic travelling towards Shaw is likely to be very representative for Shaw.

SpeedWatch

Rest assured we will continue to deploy our teams as soon as training for new volunteers is complete.

Hello Teresa and Councillor Baines

Thank you again for talking me through some of the road safety/speeding issues when we met on 23/08/2022.

We understand Wiltshire Councils policy on SIDs. Thank you for explaining it to me and I have also read Wiltshire Highways Maintenance Policies, Appendix 4, Appendix B since. The policy is very clear.

From our local perspective we are not 100% convinced regarding the cited research and we note:

- 1. Somerset Council policy states that "Research has examined if VASs still have a positive effect on driver behaviour after one year of installation. It was found the signs still maintained their positive effects".
- 2. TRL Report TRL548 concludes that "There is no evidence that in time, drivers become less responsive to the [SID] signs, even over three years".
- 3. TRL Report PPR 314 was very specific to traffic conditions in London and in any event states that "Each site is different, and so expert judgement should inform how regularly signs are replaced".

We recognise that MWPC may be constrained by Wiltshire Council policy, but we think it would be helpful if the above could be fed back to WC and we think there is a case for some local judgement.

I hope this is helpful.

Dear Planning Committee members and MWPC Officers,

Further to the subject being raised (by me) at last night's Planning Committee meeting this is a reply from the Department for Transport responding to a Freedom of Information request by a Bowerhill resident:-

"National Highways' M4-Dorset Coast study is considering strategic road connectivity from the M4 (between the M5 and the A34) and the Dorset Coast. It is assessing whether an alternative corridor would provide a better solution to connectivity than the A36/ A46 corridor which is the current Strategic Road Network route. There are a number of potential alternative corridors that are being assessed, including the A350. If shown to perform better than the existing A36/ A46 corridor, the study may recommend the possible adoption of one or more alternative strategic corridors and where future investment may be needed on them. **The study is ongoing and is now expected to report in early 2023**. Further information is provided in the attached newsletter from earlier in 2022".

The newsletter referred to is the one which says "the study is due to complete in late 2022" - see attached.

Also attached is Wiltshire Council's costing document which confirms they will not be submitting their Outline Business Case until March 2023.

"OBC submission delayed to March 2023 to enable further public consultation, preparation of Carbon Management Plan and consideration of National Highways M4 to Dorset Coast Connectivity study."

The total cost of the scheme, which was £135 million, is now £238 million (an increase of 76%), with a completion date of 2028.
